### Reflecting - Rev. Sandra Houghton

Shining clearly throughout the Apostle Paul's writings is his passionate commitment to evangelism and to nurturing the young churches scattered across Asia Minor and Europe. His commitment was extremely important to these Christian communities who often faced stiff opposition and persecution, and who often had little in the way of resources. They did not have the New Testament, as it hadn't been compiled yet and had limited access to Old Testament writings. Visits from teachers and evangelists would have been rare, and sometimes there were problems with erroneous teachings.

So, the arrival of a letter from the apostle Paul must have been a cause for rejoicing. And his letters, we know, were valued by these churches as they were often copied (which is why they have survived) and shared with other churches. The letters mix pastoral concern and encouragement, together with his frank and authoritative teachings which he translates into practical advice on living authentic, faithful Christian lives.

Paul maintains his commitment to these churches through all the many difficulties he faced. Never content to merely 'convert' someone to the Christian faith, for Paul, faith was to be much more than assent to a set of beliefs, faith was to be lived out in every aspect of life in action and word. Faith was lived out in a community of believers that worked together, each freely offering their contribution, each seeking to love and support the other, each working to maintain the unity of the whole, and looking to the example of Jesus Christ, head of the Church.

Today is the anniversary of the birth of an extraordinary man, Raoul Wallenberg, who offered his giftedness with grace and courage for the sake of others. He is credited with saving about 100,000 Jews from certain death in Nazi occupied Budapest during the later stages of the Second World War.

Wallenberg was a Swedish businessman who became Sweden's special envoy in Budapest, Hungary between July and December 1944. With the permission of the Swedish government, he issued thousands of 'protective passports' which identified the subjects as Swedish subjects awaiting repatriation and thus prevented their deportation to the death camps. The 'passports' did not have any real legal standing, but they looked official and were generally accepted by the Hungarian and German authorities.

He sheltered thousands of Jews in 32 buildings that he rented and designated as Swedish territory, thereby claiming diplomatic immunity for the occupants. He did everything in his power to save Jews, bribing officials where necessary, making threats to high-ranking Germans of prosecution by war crimes tribunals, and generally defying the authorities. He was killed by the Russians in 1947.

His was the most successful rescue of Jews in the entire Second World War period. Raoul Wallenberg was only a young man, but he had enormous courage, a sharp intellect, and the capacity to act with daring and decisiveness. He used all of his God given gifts to try to save as many Jews as possible.

God calls people in many ways. What is important is that we respond to a call that God makes upon our lives with faithfulness and obedience. **God calls people to action**. Actions that are compassionate, loving, courageous, generous, unselfish and life-giving and consistent with the actions of Christ.

Paul was concerned to ensure that the Ephesians kept their focus clearly on Christ Jesus, as he was aware that they were vulnerable and could easily be led astray. He used the analogy of a boat on high seas that is easily blown off course.

People are often easily led astray. When Raoul Wallenberg made his courageous stand to save Jews from extermination by the Nazis, most local Christians did nothing to help. Many supported

the Nazis, as they had been taught to be prejudiced against the Jews, sometimes even by church ministers and leaders. Even those who opposed the actions of the Nazis mostly did nothing. Fear paralysed them.

It shocks us, but reminds us that we need to always be focusing on the example and teaching of Jesus Christ, and testing all the pronouncements of politicians, leaders, the media, our friends, and neighbours by that barometer before we decide whether we should support them. Christians are called not to just simply go along with the crowd, but rather to follow in the footsteps of Jesus Christ. This may well lead us onto a 'path less travelled'.

Let us be open to the call of God upon our lives, focused on emulating the example of Jesus, and faithful even when the cost is high. Amen.
