Reflecting - Rev. Heather den Houting

The mountaintop experience.

Have you ever had a mountaintop experience? These are those moments of revelation, or brightness or clarity where for some reason you are in a space where things seem to be revealed to you in a fullness of understanding. Quick note! You do not have to be on a mountain to experience this. Revelation can be experienced in any place; the trick is whether you are prepared to receive it.

In the Biblical passages we read today we hear about two accounts of these mountain top experiences and the narrative is very quick to point out the extraordinary transformation that occurred as a result. As Christian disciples our interest should be to see how these moments have changed our lives, and how recognising and adapting the awesome glory of God into our lives will continue to transform us.

So, we start by Moses, who having spent 40 days and nights away from the community, returns in a spectacular manner with the covenantal tablets. He glows.

Then we have Jesus, who travelling with witnesses to the mountain top, experiences a visit from the fathers of the faith and a voice from God, and is transfigured as a result. He glows too.

So, we can tell that we have to pay attention to the fact that something transcendent has occurred in both these instances and we are invited to piece together the theological narrative that is being presented to us. Firstly, Luke makes a clear parallel with the Old Testament narrative to drive home the theological point that the old covenant with God has been transformed by Jesus, who is the new covenant. This is the basis of our Christian faith and we should not be surprised by the approach.

Secondly, what perhaps is less obvious, but is so relevant to us today is how the people dealt with the transformative power of God in both instances. Moses had to veil himself from the human gaze. The implication being that the glory of God was so overwhelming there had to be a way of reducing the impact so that people could comprehend the message without being harmed.

Similarly, the disciples' reaction to the glory revealed to them is very pragmatic. 'Should we build tents for these people?', they ask. The narrator makes it clear that this was a clumsy response because they were overwhelmed by the revelation. And then, they did not speak of the incident – something that was almost like the veiling of the glory of God so that Jesus' work could continue without immediate harm.

This makes me think about how clumsily we can deal with the awesome power of God. Do we prefer to veil it, build tents for it, deflect it so that we can remain silent? Do we become pragmatic in dealing with transformative experiences so that we can manage the divine? Do we make God into our own image, affording God our own sensibilities?

I wonder whether a better approach might be to practice and prepare for these mountaintop experiences, knowing that while we might not be able to sustain living constantly in the fullness of God's glory, we might just be able to allow ourselves to be transformed. Where we might be ready to receive in the time of inspiration, and then having the courage of a community that reflects that glory as much as possible.

When we practice what reflecting the glory of God looks like, we might find that not only our lives are changed, but also the lives of people around us. Yes, we will not be perfect, yes, we



will be clumsy, yes, we will be inclined to diminish it and veil it and explain it away. But the promises of God are, if we follow Jesus, the new covenant; then we participate in a glory beyond our imagining. We are invited into these mountaintop experiences to be transformed, to find those moments of inspiration and clarity. As the community of Christ, are we prepared to be transfigured by them?
