Reflecting - Rev. Deacon Wendy Elson

How inconvenient!

Sent.

"But I am comfortable, God. My fire is warm and my toast is hot and I can't be far from a coffee shop.

Please can you see if you can find 70 others to go and keep me as a back up at least? That way if other things come up, I can make them into excuses. If I can't go, there will be someone who will fill my spot. I will go another time. When the weather is better and my cup is fuller.

And don't send me without my bag, what am I going to put my things in, you know my mobile phone and computer tablet are necessary, a few things for contingencies and some chocolate bars for if I get hungry. Spare socks?

No sandals!! What about my good walking shoes and a spare pair of thongs. And don't tell me the labourers are few, that is not part of my concern, I will just do my little bit from home."

It's tempting to skip past the bits we don't like but this reading makes it really clear that we are all called, all summoned to serve and all sent by God. And then when we do listen to the call, we are not given power for its own sake, but rather we are given grace. I hear verse 20 as saying, 'Don't get all excited that you can do these amazing things, but realise it is all down to grace which is given and shared.' And in this you can rejoice because you too are included!

These passages make it very hard to rest on our laurels, to act like God is not calling US, RIGHT HERE AND RIGHT NOW. Certainly, some of us have difficult circumstances but yet we are called. It's a really scary world to go into just now, but yet we are called. And the first thing, in following, is to let go, let go of all we hold onto so tightly and trust that God's provision is sufficient. That may be the hardest part of all. Especially for

us as individuals and actually even harder for us as churches. I do wonder if this is Jesus' pattern of an institutional church, he models structure but without the holding on. It's a 'form into a team and just get on with it' kind of model.

In this world that seems crazy right now, being sent feels like a big thing and I wonder how we are sent and how we might fulfil our calling. There are some hints here.

In the 2 Kings reading Naaman had to let go. He had a very clear idea of what healing would look like and the form it would follow. Until he let go and took the leap nothing was going to change. And the Psalm tells us that there will be tough times but that rejoicing is inherently connected to the experience of wrestling and struggle.

How might these readings enlighten, and be enlightened by, the Galatians reading? Restoration through gentleness, bearing each other's burdens, testing our work, not deceiving ourselves by thinking we have all the answers and are more than we really are. In this world which seems out of control right now, where heresy seems to be acceptable and actually admired, a few things here stand out. God will not be mocked, and we reap what we sow. If what we sow is to benefit ourselves we will reap corruption. But if it is to benefit the Spirit, the Kin-dom, the common-wealth, it will reap life. We are to model this, living as sent people who speak truth boldly. The question 'What is truth?' seems a bit fluid just now, and the gospel seems to be sadly distorted depending on who is using its texts. But Truth must always be backed by the action of loving others, of serving one another in love and grace and mercy. If these are missing, if the fruits of the Spirit are not here, be not deceived. (Galatians 5:22-23- The Spirit Fruits are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control).

So, if you feel weary, remember there is life in sowing for the benefit of serving God and the family of faith, in knowing yourselves to be sent to sow for these purposes. Nothing else matters, let it go. No other forms of legalistic



expression, forms of church that may hold you to a certain type of experience, no doctrines and dogmas about what your faith must look like on the surface. Peace and mercy are yours and the grace of Jesus rests upon your spirit. Let go and trust God. You are sent and equipped by the one who loves you more than life and the grace of this One is sufficient for your needs. Your mission (should you choose to accept it), your sending purpose, is to live out of this faith, hope and love. And share it.
