### Reflecting - Rev'd. Ian Brown

#### "reforming Jesus"

It happens in most areas of our lives. Some welcome change and do it well and others do not. There are some who like the idea of reforming who we understand Jesus to be and

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how we are reformed in Jesus. And others who want no change ever. No small debate!

Then our readings have the odd question about marriage in the afterlife in Luke. Jesus replies that death isn't such an issue for God. And the grand words from Haggai,

"In the second year of King Darius, the word of the LORD came by the prophet Haggai, saying: "Speak now to Zerubbabel"

and then a message to get on with their work and be encouraged by God's presence. Both of them are addressing a situation of change.

Some reforms just happen; the world gets COVID and MRNA vaccines blossom, seemingly out of nowhere. A child abuse scandal rocks the family daycare sector and reforms are suddenly all the priority. Reforms do need to keep happening!

As with any proposed change, we need to know the questions before we launch out looking for answers. People often questioned Jesus. Classics like "who is my neighbour?" and "is it lawful to pay taxes", and then today's gospel; "who will be married to this woman who had seven husbands when they get to heaven?"

We all need to ask questions, it's a part of how we learn and how we communicate; "what have you been up to? How are you? We would be lost without the ability to ask questions. The religious leaders of Jesus day had a great privilege. We've gained from their questions and Jesus' answers.

The Sadducees asked Jesus the question about heaven because, as faithful traditional Jews, they didn't believe in an afterlife and wanted to show Jesus up. They were hiding behind their question. Lots of us still do that today, we ask, "what about this tragedy, doesn't that show God not caring? What about injustice, does it matter to God what we do?

On the big question of life after death, I'd want to say don't be put off by today's distant cousins of the cynical Sadducees, who want to



make fun of eternal life. God's love is faithful-love; the Hebrew is; *HESED* - dependable for ever! Jesus answers, 'They cannot die any more, but are like the angels and are children of God, having become children of resurrection.'

We are always on risky ground trying to picture the nature of this eternal life that Jesus speaks so enticingly about. The Sadducees look ridiculous with the nonsense about one bride and seven husbands. The idea is odious of a woman being treated as a family heirloom, passed being on. Any picture we try to draw about eternity depends on images from the life we know. Projecting that onto eternity is just silly. The "life abundant, eternal life" that Jesus spoke of was evocatively promised, alluded to, but never defined. What we believe about it will not alter reality one bit. Jesus' discussion here is part of a movement of reformation. Ideas, beliefs and convictions were in a process of change in Jesus' time, as much as ours and Jesus is not afraid to push in a new direction.

Greek philosophers believed that humans are, by nature, immortal souls; the body and life on earth, a crude prison. For them, immortality was our right; death could restore us, as we escape to our true element. These ideas have worked their way into many philosophies over the ages. But this is not faith in Christ, not part of Christian belief. The modern, self-centred approach says the world, God, the afterlife must all be as each of us imagines them. No! Jesus' reforming opens hopeful possibility and promotes fullness of life, not a promise to fulfil everyone's fantasies.

Back in the prophet Haggai's day, life was hard. The Israelites had returned from exile, the crops were poor and they were asking, "is God really still with us?" The answer is a promise to us too, as we ask questions and talk about the reform needed now in us and in the church. "All you people, take courage, work, for I am with you, says the Lord, my Spirit lives among you." Questions or not — that's God's bottom line answer to the Israelites who were so anxious, and I believe it's

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God's answer to us still. Take courage, get on with the most important things first and be assured that God's Spirit is amongst us.

The Good News is, as Jesus says, "God is the God of the living," - the God of abundant life! God wants to bless all with the fullness of this abundant life. Reforming us and then perhaps, through us, to many more by God's grace. Amen.
