Finish this sentence...

If, at first, you don't succeed...

You're right, ...

try, try again.

Somewhere deep in my memory I am learning to tie shoelaces, ride a bicycle, play the guitar, knit, pass a chemistry exam, or a thousand other things, not all at once, and this is what I hear. If at first you don't succeed, try, try again. It's from a poem by an unknown author and the words encouraging perseverance usually came from a parent or a mentor. Perseverance can be described simply as the ability to keep doing something difficult. The goal might be that by keeping on trying, we succeed, and we learn to do it well.

Being a disciple of Jesus can be difficult and requires perseverance.

The reading from the gospel of Luke was written after the fall of Jerusalem, the destruction of the second temple, and may explain the utter devastation that remained of the once majestic and beautiful building. Not one stone left upon another. In this apocalyptic discourse, Jesus is preparing the first disciples for what is to come, by

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teaching them to be discerning, to have courage and to persevere. This is not going to be an easy road. Not for them, and not for us.

Be discerning; "beware that you are not led astray". Sometimes it's hard to find the quiet word of truth amongst the many, many voices shouting to be heard and be believed, not just in the village square these days, but everywhere. Who are your mentors in the faith? Whose voice has rung true for you and helped you to grow and be discerning? Are there new voices that you might consider and learn from? Do you have trusted and faithful friends who will talk openly about discipleship, and discern and grow with you?

Have courage; "do not be terrified". It's hard not to be terrified as nation constantly rises against nation, and kingdom building, at the expense of the poor and marginal, seems to be the theme of the day. Have courage amid these dreadful portents. Easy to say, hard to do. Yet, as followers of Jesus, we are called to do just that. Fear is immobilising. Courage allows action. We are called, just as the first disciples were called, to testify. While that may not be before Kings and Governors, it might well be before neighbours and family. We are called to be strong and testify to the power of loving-kindness in words and actions. That takes courage. Jesus tells the disciples that he will give them words and wisdom, even in the face of harsh opposition by those who are closest. Do we have that sort of courage?

Persevere; "by your endurance you will gain your souls". In the epistle reading today Paul tells the Thessalonians who are obviously having some trouble in the church; "do not be weary in doing what is right." Sometimes it is totally exhausting trying to keep on doing what is right. It's often easier to give up and harder to persevere. Dogged determination seems to be a family trait where I come from, but it's not always for the best. You can hang on to something, persisting while it causes harm to you or to others, of sheer bloody-mindedness. just Perseverance needs to know her goal. For the



disciples, it seems, the goal was "to gain your souls."

That's worth pausing for a moment of reflection. What does it mean to 'gain your soul.'

Maybe it's easier to know what it is that is soul-destroying, what it is that leads you to seemingly gain the world and lose your soul. Of course we live in different times to the first disciples, and the struggles we endure for the sake of our faith are different now and different depending on where we live. What is the goal of our perseverance in the faith? For me, it's living a life of love, inclusion, acceptance, hospitality and humility, while glimpsing heaven in the here and now. What is it for you?
