Listening

Read: Isaiah 7: 10-16, Matthew: 1: 18-25

For these words of faith and for Jesus the Word Thanks be to God.

Reflecting - Rev. Anneke Oppewal

In Isaiah 7 we meet King Ahaz. He is caught between a rock and a hard place, between Judah and Aram. His country is under threat from two enemies who would both appreciate his help against the other.

Ahaz however does not budge and keeps to the advice coming from God through Isaiah: not to squander his loyalty to either of them but to remain his own man, trusting that God will be with him. Trusting the promise that before a little boy is to be born to his household, who will be able to distinguish between right and wrong, his enemies will be no more.

In Matthew 1:18-25 Joseph is also between a rock and a hard place. He is engaged to Mary and we are told the couple does not yet live together. But Mary is pregnant, the father unknown, and, according to Deuteronomy 22:20-21, by law this means she could be stoned to death.

As a righteous man Joseph is compelled to follow the laws of God. But he is also a man of compassion, so he decides not to bring an accusation against her but to leave quietly instead.

Then an angel appears to Joseph in a dream and gives him a message: the child in Mary's womb is the promised Emmanuel - God with us - and he will save God's people.

This knowledge does not make Joseph's life any easier but it does shed divine light on his predicament. When Joseph wakes up, he gets out



of bed with a new resolve that is motivated by his love and trust in God.

Joseph would not have been any more certain than we would be waking up after a vivid dream that this was really a message from God. The fact that he lets the dream inspire him to listen to his inner feelings of compassion and love rather than to follow the law, shows what kind of man he is: a man with his heart and faith in the right place. And that is what keeps Mary and the baby in her womb safe and alive.

Ahaz and Joseph both met the challenge. The challenge of staying true to their faith and close to the heart of God, rather than succumb to pressure from outside or blindly follow law or custom.

What is the dream God has given you? And what is it that challenges you to keep to your faith and trust? Do you believe there is a power out there strong enough to make a change? Seeking to be born in our midst, waiting to make a difference? Like Ahaz did? Like Isaiah did? Like Joseph did?
