Reflecting - Rev. Heather den Houting

Tonight, I'm thinking about the shepherds and how much we know about sheep grazing in the Middle East at this time. Not much I suspect, so I wonder whether we might be prepared to reimagine this story in an Australian context.

We remember in the Christmas story that it was a time of dislocation. Under the rule of Rome, the inhabitants of this contested land were under instructions to move. It was arduous for the poor and not at all safe. The shepherd's story is

therefore not a peaceful scene in a peaceful country. Rather being on watch during the night illustrates the ordinary hardship of the life at the time, which included tribal and political conflict, drought, famine and predators.

In Australia we have our own significant stories to share around sheep. From the wealth we gained by "riding on the sheep's back" to the current large pastoral holdings across the continent, still subject to drought and flood. We too can narrate stories of contested land, people in violent conflict with each other, drought and dust, starvation and predators.

So, let's imagine instead three drovers who are doing the hard slog. Droving was a tough, nomadic life involving expert horsemanship, navigation, and survival skills. They certainly needed to keep the flock together to maintain their livelihood, and nightfall would mean being alert to danger. The horses are hobbled, the dogs are fed, the drovers have recounted the events of the day and are making plans for the next. They are tired, and they are gathered around a campfire.

Into this scene, comes a terrifying visitation. They are absolutely petrified at an overwhelming and frightening spectacle. The soft glow of campfire against the trees is replaced by a light so bright that it seems that day has arrived. Dogs barking, horses startled, sheep moving in mobs seeking shelter. Nobody is asleep, nobody is at peace.

Into this frantic blinding light that has replaced the night comes the message:

Do not be afraid. You are receiving good news from God. Rejoice - your liberation is at hand. The world will be saved by the Messiah. The sign of this is a baby in a manger nearby. Glory be to God. Peace to all.

In this place, we struggle to comprehend this outstanding message made in power, given to the powerless, about the vulnerability of God. The yearning that we all have for a transformed life is answered by the mundane. These dusty overwhelmed drovers, stop their plans, put aside



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their fear and instead seek out a child born to a dispossessed family. The sheep are gathered again, but the journey is different.

The prophetic message in this story is that from the most vulnerable of things, the world can be transformed. The most unredeemed people and circumstances can be messengers of justice, righteousness, hope, peace, joy and love. That this promise is available to us at all times, in all places and all circumstances. In the places of war and dispossession, in the long paddock, in the troubled streets of our cities and towns, in the grieving of the lost and broken.

Do not be afraid, your redeemer is here and near to you. In the quiet glow of the campfire, know that God is with us.
